In recent years, with escalating territorial disputes between Japan and its neighboring countries, East Asian security has attracted the attention of policy communities and area experts. On the other hand, political scientist have not produced the research outputs regarding East Asian security. We need to fill the gap by examining traditional subjects in international security such as deterrence and alliance politics in the context of contemporary East Asia. We advance the security research with rigorous social science methods. Our goals are to publish our findings in internationally respected journals and to compile them as an edited book.

As a result of the last year workshop, we recently published a special issue, [Regional Rivalries and Order in East Asia](#), in *International Relations of the Asia-Pacific*.
