| Lesson topic                                  | Globalization and the COVID-19 pandemic are completely changing the world in which we live. In this new scenario, the main question to be answered from the labor law perspective is how to reach a balance between labor rights and economic interests. The International Labour Organization (ILO) – at the international level – and the European Union, at the supranational level, are trying to answer that question using different tools. The aim of this course is to teach students about the similarities and differences in terms of the two approaches.   |  |
| Lesson target                                 | Course objectives include the following:<br>- analyzing the sources of the ILO and EU;<br>- understanding the challenges faced by the ILO and EU in order to balance economic interests<br>with social needs;<br>- applying the examined legal tools to the main global issues: discrimination, migration, unionism,<br>and labor conditions; and<br>- developing students' critical thinking skills.<br>By the end of the course, students should:<br>- have advanced knowledge of the ILO and EU,<br>- be able to identify and analyze the legal issues related to the topic,<br>- conduct basic research on the topic, and<br>- think about the topic critically. |  |
| Syllabus and<br>plan                          | Seven lectures will be delivered for the period February 14–18, as follows: February 15 and 17, (3:10–6:30 p.m.); February 14, 16, and 18 (5:00–6:30 p.m.). After dealing with the structure of the ILO and EU and pointing out their interactions, we will analyze the main sources of both the ILO and EU related to discrimination, unionism, migration, and labor conditions in order to stress differences and similarities.<br>The topics and schedule may be adjusted depending on our progress.<br>The lessons will be recorded; therefore, students missing a class may watch it later.   |  |
